Message from Dan Hannaway, Leadership Council Coordinator

Dear Friends of the Force,



The club leaders in the Mountain States Region had an information laden conference call at the end of March, and I would like to share the highlights with you.

As in the past, fees for domestic journeys/exchanges (\$10 per night per ambassador) are sent directly to FFI in Atlanta.

However, unlike in the past, the fees collected this year will be returned to the respective host regions for distribution in early 2018. The club leaders in the respective regions will determine how the funds can best be used to benefit the clubs in the region.

The new FFI website (<http://www.friendshipforce.org/>) is up and running. I encourage everyone to look at it. If you scroll down to the bottom of the home page and click on “**Explore Member Resources**” you can view and download many important documents. Also at the bottom of the page you can enter your email address to “Receive updates and new listings from Friendship Force”.

An officially approved glossary of terms used in the Friendship Force is being developed and will be available in the near future. For example, “exchanges” are now called “journeys”.

Individual regional conferences are being replaced by “Super Conferences”. This means that instead of Denver hosting the Mountain States Region Conference in 2018, the West Coast Region will host a Super Conference next year to include the Pacific Northwest/ Northern Rockies, Mountain States, and Western Canada Regions. The Conference will be held May 3-5 in Elk Grove, California. There will be the usual post-conference homestays and tours. More details will be published in the near future.

A Story about a Czech Bakery

This is a bakery story that fascinates me. About 100 years ago, my Czech daughter-in-law Blanka's ancestors, the Nenadals, created a bakery in Czechoslovakia in the town of Strančice, about 15 miles south of Prague, the nation's capital. They baked traditional sour dough bread, small buns and sweets for locals and also delivered them to restaurants along the route up to Prague.

At the end of WWII and the defeat of Germany, Czechoslovakia fell under Soviet rule with the Communist Party in power. The Soviets nationalized the bakery, transforming the owner Nenadals into bakery workers and delivery drivers for their own bakery. It was a difficult blow to the family, but they were grateful they had survived German Nazi occupation.

The family lived a few miles south in the village of Čerčany, in a house built by one of their ancestors long ago. It is located on several acres filled with a variety of established fruit trees. The fruit harvests provided the bakery with the fillings for those delicious Czech tarts many of us are familiar with.

The bakery produced Russian style bread for over 40 years. In 1989, if you recall, the Prague residents staged a massive peaceful protest against soviet communist rule. They refer to it as the peaceful Velvet Revolution. The Soviets did not resist militarily, its troops refusing to fire upon the crowd. In fact, they simply watched the protest. The Communist Party relinquished control in Czechoslovakia, precipitating similar events throughout Eastern Europe leading to the collapse of the Soviet Union and the tear down of the Soviet-built wall separating East and West Germany.

Sadly, the bakery ovens were shut down, the building was abandoned and the structure fell into disarray.

A Prague democratic parliament was established. The new government workers noticed that the Nenadals owned the bakery before the Soviets took control. One official said, "Hey, I wonder if they want it back?" Ownership was returned to the eager and emotional Nenadal family and children. They worked hard to return the bakery to its original condition, fired up the still working ovens and once again started producing the wonderful baked breads and goods they were known for so long ago. They built a shop to sell the breads to locals. (Of course, they also stocked a variety of Czech beers to complement the bread!) They opened a second bakery a few miles south in the town of Benešov. Miraculously, the family preserved the sour dough yeast starter begun over 100 years ago, which they still use today.

The bakery is now run by Babička (grandma) and her son Jaro. Her daughter Blanka helps in the summer when she takes her three little already bilingual daughters, my grandchildren. My son Todd visits summers too. He works out of his house in Virginia and from the third floor office he built at the Nenadal family home. And of course, when I can, I visit too- to see family and too sample all the wonderful fresh baked goods we are so fortunate to still enjoy. Is this not a happy ending?

After the exchange ended, Hope still stayed with us, and we spent a day seeing the small surrounding towns of New Braunfels and Gruene (pronounced Greene) touring the SAS shoe factory to learn how to make shoes, and even doing a little shoe shopping. After all, a sale is sometimes just too good to miss. We went to a HUGE dance hall that night. Hope said it is a necessary part of the Texas experience. Hope also arranged for us to have free tickets to the rodeo. She told us how to get free parking, where to have the best lunch at the rodeo, who had the best ice cream, where the best museums were, and where to park to do the River Walk and the Alamo. A Message from FFI's Board

Dear Members of Friendship Force International,

As Friendship Force International confronts the political realities of our time and the forces that seek to divide us, we have no doubt that each member of the Friendship Force family will respond to those realities with strengthened devotion and focus on our mission, beliefs, and values. This imperative has been thrust upon us, and in honoring our organization's legacy, we must not waver.

The very first exchanges that Friendship Force orchestrated highlighted our main responsibility as citizen diplomats, building on the philosophy that **“where people traveled was not important, but that why they were going would make the important difference”** (*Charlene Terrell quoting Wayne Smith, The Other Side of the Mountain, p.17*). Forty years later, our global network of citizen ambassadors has participated in thousands of international cultural exchanges, empowered with the knowledge that we CAN each make a difference in the world.

Seasoned Friendship Force ambassadors know that our shared commitment to the values of being a good citizen diplomat is sometimes easier said than put into action. The extent to which we can build friendships, exercise flexibility, adapt to unforeseen difficulties, and promote understanding can become complicated when our own beliefs and understandings of the world are being challenged. Paraphrasing a very famous line from U.S. President John F. Kennedy's 1962 *Moon Speech*, **we go not because it is easy, but because it is hard. Because that goal will serve to organize and measure the best of our energies and skills, because that challenge is one that we are willing to accept, one we are unwilling to postpone, and one which we intend to win.** While we are not going to the moon, both the outward journey of traveling and the inward journey of trying to understand are no less difficult, and there is no better time than *right now* to be that bright example of citizen diplomacy in action.

Because we believe in a future for humanity that is far more peaceful than the world in front of us, we travel and host, extending hands of friendship to others in hopes of developing greater understanding across the barriers that separate people. Over the past forty years, many of us have witnessed the positive change that occurs when new seeds of friendship take root and former barriers come down. But today, there are new barriers to overcome, requiring that we sow new seeds of friendship around the world - perhaps even in our own countries.

We urge you to stay true to our organization's purpose and to remain steadfast in our commitment to be good citizen diplomats. The FFI pledge reminds us that the world is watching us and how we react as an organization to world events, so let's show them what we have been about these last four decades and what we will continue to be in the decades to come. Let us offer the world a voice of reason that cuts through the chaos, and invite our fellow citizens of the world to take action beyond words, as **we promote our mission of international friendship and understanding.**
